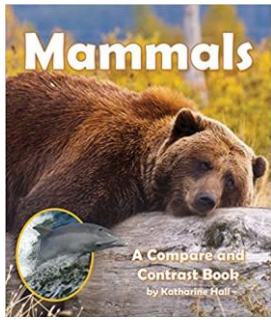
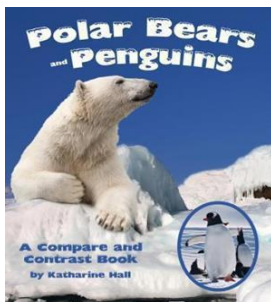

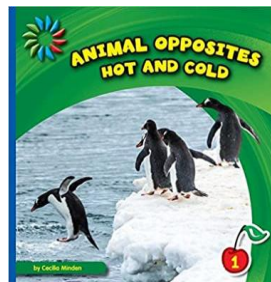
**Mammals: A Compare and Contrast Book: A Compare and Contrast Book by Katherine Hall**

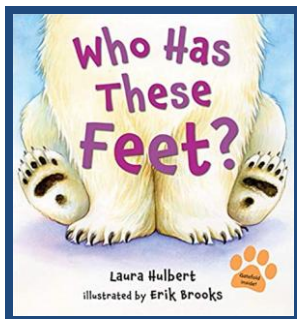
**Polar Bears and Penguins: A Compare and Contrast Book by Katherine Hall**

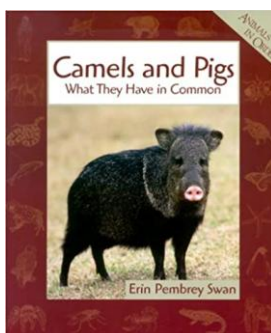
**Hot and Cold (Animal Opposites) by Cecilla Minden**
