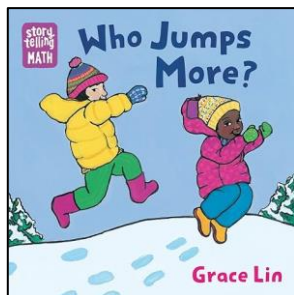


Recommended Reading for “Little Joey”



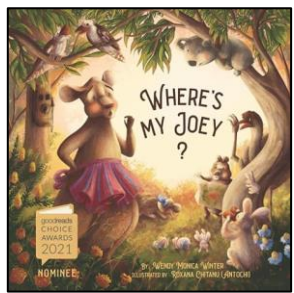
Explore My World – National Geographic: Kangaroos, by Jill Esbaum

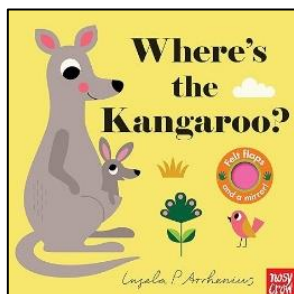
Where's My Joey? by Wendy Monica Winter
